CT125 Overview of Church History

CM130 Leadership in Various Ministry Contexts (Advanced Diploma elective)

It focuses on the responsibilities and boundaries of leading volunteers in ministry.

BS106 Hebrew 1A (BD elective/BTh elective) (over two days: Wednesday and Friday)

The Hebrew 1A unit aims to prepare students to read the Hebrew Scriptures through learning its script, a beginning vocabulary, and a basic knowledge of its grammar. The unit focuses on helping students develop skills of recognising key grammatical features of biblical texts, and using these skills to translate simple sentences.

CM153 Cross-Cultural Christian Communication (elective)

The unit contributes to the AdvDBMM and BD/BTh courses by Lecturers: providing students with a framework for understanding and relating Time: to cultural diversity and the processes involved in cross-cultural communication. It focuses on observing and reflecting on cultures according to key parameters (eg shame/honour, status/leadership, symbols/language) alongside investigating the underlying processes that are realized in surface cultural manifestations.

It focuses on the unfolding self-revelation of God in human history, as revealed in the biblical literature. It will assist in the development of the graduate's understanding of God's work in this world, through a greater appreciation of how God has revealed himself culminating in the Lord Jesus Christ.

The unit explores the origins and development of the orthodox and catholic tradition through historical study of the early church (70-451AD) and briefly surveys Christian developments through the middle ages. It traces the history of Christianity beyond the period studied in New Testament 1, it is foundational for the study of both Doctrine 2 and Church History 2. It will assist the graduate in, developing an appreciation of primary sources, knowledge of the key developments of the period, capacity for historical research, and a greater self-understanding within the Catholic tradition.

CM182 Influences on & Issues for Australian Christian Women (elective)
